

What is Open Access?

Open Access is the practice of making scholarly material (e.g. journal articles) freely available via the internet, ideally under a licence that allows for sharing and reuse.

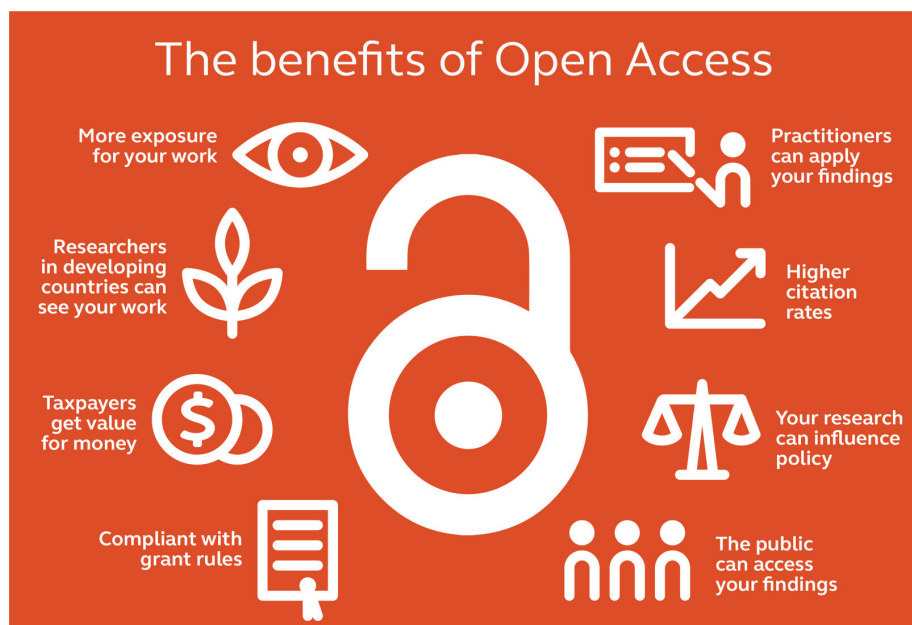

What are the benefits of Open Access?

- With Open Access your work is **accessible** to a wider audience, including those who may not be able to afford to pay, such as charities, policy makers and patient groups.
- Open licences make it clear how your work can be **shared** and **reused**.
- The more people read/access your work, the more opportunity there is for **citation** of your work.

When do I need to think about Open Access?

- **Before submission:** when you are choosing a journal
- **On submission:** selecting the right licence and/or if you are including a statement about rights
- **On acceptance:** upload your accepted manuscript in CRIS
- **On publication:** check that your article is deposited in Europe PubMed Central if your funder requires this



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How can I publish my work with Open Access?

Stop!

If it looks like you may be charged for making your paper open access, stop! Find out about funding for immediate open access before you submit.

Gold open access

Corresponding SGUL authors may be able to publish open access at no upfront cost under one of our many **Read & Publish** deals. Eligibility details are on our webpage:

Green open access (self-archiving)

You can make your publication open access for free by uploading your final accepted manuscript in your CRIS (Current Research Information System) profile. Library staff will check terms and conditions and make the paper publicly available.

3 things worth knowing about Open Access

1. You may not need to pay for it
2. Your funder may require it
3. There are multiple ways to achieve it
